AB 169 (Portantino) Communicable disease: involuntary testing	AB 169 adds custodial officers, custody assistants, and nonsworn uniformed employees of a law enforcement agency to the list of persons who may seek to have an arrestee's blood tested, either voluntarily or by court order, for specified communicable diseases when the custodial officer is exposed to that arrestee's blood or bodily fluids while the custodial officer is acting within the scope of his or her duties. <i>Sponsored by Laborers International Union of North America – Local 77.</i>	<p>Oppose</p>	Passed by Legislature On the Governor's Desk
AB 221 (Portantino) HIV Testing: Skin Punctures	AB 221 permits HIV counselors to perform skin punctures if a) He or she works under the direction of a licensed physician or surgeon; and, b) He or she has been trained in both rapid HIV test proficiency for skin puncture blood tests and oral swab tests and in universal infection control precautions, consistent with best infection control practices established by the Division of Occupational Safety and Health in the Department of Industrial Relations and the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. <i>Sponsored by AIDS Healthcare Foundation and SF AIDS Foundation.</i>	<p>Support</p>	Passed by Legislature On the Governor's Desk

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AB 367 (Galgiani) Medi-Cal: HIV drug treatment: developmental services: provider reimbursement	<p>Existing law establishes the Providers Interim Payment Fund that is used to pay Medi-Cal providers of drug treatment services for persons with HIV, as well as other Medi-Cal providers, in case a budget has not been enacted on or before July 1 of a given fiscal year. AB 367 provides for the transfer to this fund of an amount sufficient to make continued payments to these providers on or after July 1, 2009 in the event that no budget has been enacted.</p>	<p>Support</p>	<p>5/28/09: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee</p> <p>2 year Bill</p>
AB 382 (Ammiano) Department of Corrections and rehabilitation: inmates and wards classification	<p>Existing law requires the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation to classify inmates and wards in order to prevent inmate and ward sexual violence and to promote inmate and ward safety. Existing law also requires the department to consider certain characteristics of the inmate or ward when classifying the inmate. AB 1045 (J. A Perez) HIV and AIDS Reporting	<p>Existing law establishes for the reporting of information relating to HIV or AIDS infection. AB 1045 authorizes a clinical laboratory to not report CD4+ T-cell test results (a measure of white blood cells) to local health authorities when the lab can demonstrate the test results are not associated with HIV-infections. AB 1269 (Brownley) Medi-Cal: eligibly	<p>AB 1269 reforms program eligibility to the California Working Disabled Program so more disabled individuals can join the workforce by making the following changes:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Allow enrollees who are temporarily unemployed to remain in the program for up to 26 weeks (6 ½ months) during their work transition. 2. Allow enrollees to save their earnings without any limits in a separate account. 3. <p><u>AB 1397 (Jerry Hill) Tissue Donation</u></p>	<p>In 2007 SB 443 was adopted and signed into law to allow HIV/HTLV infected sperm to be used in artificial reproduction technologies through the use of sperm washing. Once the law began to be implemented in the field, problems in the language were discovered. AB 1397 seeks to fix those problems.</p> <p>Problems in SB 443 that are addressed in AB 1397:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • AB 1397 clarifies which medical professionals are responsible for the care of the HIV/HTLV infected sperm donor and for HIV/HTLV follow up of the woman; • Medical terminology language in current law has been made more accurate and inclusive of all available technologies. <p>The bill reaffirms that the Department of Health Care Services shall adopt regulations for facilities that do sperm processing. The department may propose to adopt, as initial regulations, guidelines made by the American Society for Reproductive Medicine. <i>Sponsored by American Society for Reproductive Medicine</i></p>	<p>Watch</p>	<p>Passed by Legislature On the Governor's Desk</p>
<p><u>AJR 9 (John A. Perez) Ryan White HIV/AIDS Treatment Modernization Act of 2009</u></p>	<p>AJR 9 urges the Congress and President of the United States to enact legislation that would provide for a 3-year extension of the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Treatment Modernization Act of 2006, including the existing formula-based funding for states with maturing names-based HIV reporting systems, from its current sunset on September 30, 2009, to September 30, 2012. <i>Sponsored by AIDS Project Los Angeles</i></p>	<p>Support</p>	<p>Adopted by the Assembly and Senate Chaptered by Secretary of State, Chapter No. 57, Statutes of 2009</p>
<p><u>AJR 13 (Ammiano) Blood Donation</u></p>	<p>AJR 13 requests that the President of the United States encourage, and that the Secretary of the United States Department of Health and Human Services adopt, policies that repeal the current discriminatory policies of the FDA regarding blood donation by gay, bisexual, transgender, and heterosexual males.</p>	<p>Support</p>	<p>Passed by Assembly 46-29 In the Senate</p>

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AJR 17 (Swanson) HIV/AIDS health disparities	AJR 17 urges the President of the United States, the United States Congress, and the United States Secretary of Health and Human Services to take specified actions in regards to health disparities and ethnic and racial minorities, particularly as they relate to HIV/AIDS funding.
